

Masters of Arts in Counseling Demographics (2015)



Program Statistics

Data were collected through surveying current MA students using Qualtrics. 95/230 (41%) students completed the survey. This is a substantial increase over the 16% response rate in 2014. Responses were solicited via emails to the department listserv which included a link to the Qualtrics survey. The data demonstrate that current masters in counseling students can expect most classes to have less than 20 students. Nearly 2/3 of MA students were pursuing a degree in Clinical Mental Health and about 1/3 of MA's students were pursuing a degree in school counseling.



The MTCC test results demonstrate that OU school counseling MA students, on average, pass the school licensure exam at a rate that is nearly identical to the statewide average.

2017 Master's CACREP Survey Results

A Qualtrics survey was administered to past and current students to gather their perceptions of the counseling program. Objective results including evaluation of courses, knowledge areas, and program areas allow faculty to assess their effectiveness of teaching practical knowledge to students and where to improve in their methods. The data demonstrate that most current students who responded to the survey were between the ages of 22 and 29, which is consistent with enrollment data.






Preferred Course Delivery Method

Based on student feedback, OU's department of counseling has offered more course delivery options to meet students' diverse needs. Additions have included more online course offerings and more accelerated course options. However, consistent with student feedback and faculty's need to assess interpersonal skills and student disposition, 49% of courses are offered in a traditional 16 week, in-person format.

Master's Graduate Employment Outcomes


Most students report being employed in a counseling-related field, and the starting salary data are consistent with national averages for earnings of mental health counselors, per the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Students receive regular information about job postings via the department listservs. Students also receive assistance with internship placement and are encouraged to attend professional networking opportunities that are facilitated by organizations, like OU's Theta chapter of Chi Sigma Iota (CSI).







Evaluation of Master's Program Aspects

Above: Evaluation of Master's program aspects from recent graduates. Below: Evaluation of Master's program aspects from current students.




2017 Doctoral CACREP Survey Results


The Doctor of Philosophy in Education: Counseling Program is a 64-credit hour program designed for those who wish to pursue the counseling field past their Master's degree.

*The doctoral program was previously an 84-credit program, and was changed to 64 credits beginning in 2016. The responses included in this report are representative of students who are enrolled in both the 84 and 64 credit programs. A total of 19 (10 current Ph.D. students, and 9 graduates) provided responses to the survey. Data demonstrated that the majority of Ph.D. students prefer in-person classes offered during the evening, which is congruent with the majority of Ph.D. course offerings. Additional course offerings during morning and daytime hours have been implemented as needed.


Doctoral Graduate Employment Outcomes

Ph.D. graduates reported 100% employment with earnings between \$60,000 to \$69,000 as a starting salary. Our graduates find employment in counselor education, private practice, and higher education.




The data demonstrate that Ph.D. students tend to be satisfied with course offerings and various program aspects. Exceptions included the Doctoral Internship course, Dissertation Research courses, and Program duration. We have dramatically restructured the Ph.D. program to reduce program duration. Both in cutting the number of required semester credit hours to 64 and by intentionally integrating development of research interests into pre-dissertation Ph.D. course offerings. Further, Ph.D. students are supported in accessing graduate assistantships, and opportunities for practical experience delivering lectures and conducting research with core faculty members.


Above: Evaluation of doctoral program aspects from recent doctoral graduates. Below: Evaluation of doctoral program aspects from current doctoral students.



Supervisor and Employer Reports

A survey was administered to past and current supervisors and employers to evaluate their perceptions of OUs counseling program. Supervisors' feedback is used to enhance program efficacy and ensure students' outcomes are congruent with real world counseling. We had a total of 56 responses to the supervisor/employer survey. The survey demographics reflect a wide range of types of employers and placement sites. Across the board, employers and supervisors tended to rate our graduates as strong or very strong in a variety of professional competencies.






Above: Supervisors and employers evaluate the graduate's knowledge on the above curricular areas.




Below: Supervisors and employers evaluate the graduate's professional skills.

Program Improvements

Based on previous program evaluation reports, the CNS Faculty have made multiple changes to CNS courses and curriculum. These include:

- Master's students indicated they would like more preparatory training prior to taking the National Counselor Examination (NCE). Based on this feedback, a preparation workshop that covers the NCE core areas has been developed and offered to students through OU's Theta chapter of Chi Sigma Iota. Initial feedback from attendees has been positive, and 100% of the students who participated in the workshop passed the NCE.
- Master's students requested additional courses be offered in alternate formats. As a result, the CNS Faculty have offered the Couples and Family, Grief and Loss, and Theories of Counseling courses in a fully online format during summer semesters.
- Doctoral student comprehensive exams identified a weakness in research training. The doctoral curriculum has been revamped and now includes stronger research instruction.
- Students indicated that program forms and advising materials were not readily accessible. The CNS Faculty have updated the CNS website, and it now includes additional program information.
