"Johan Huizinga, *The Waning of the Middle Ages*, and the Writing of History" 2016

Abstract: "Contemporary professional history does not train its practitioners to write works of genuine innovation. The commitment to archivedriven research and the need to establish a niche for one's research discourages originality. It also denies the validity of history which reveals the emotional engagement of the writer or appeals beyond the narrow confines of the professional historian.

Johann Huizinga's work, especially his magnum opus
The Waning of the Middle
Ages, serves to remind us of how breathtaking and bold history can be. In print for eight decades, Huizinga's great book is loved outside of the halls of academe despite its inadequacies and stands as one of the most influential works of the past century."

"Assessing Nonlinear Behaviors in an Agent-Based Model" 2016

Abstract: "This chapter discusses the role of sensitivity analysis in the development of an Agent-Based Model (ABM) designed to explore hypothetical scenarios relating to cultural transmission in small-scale societies. Sensitivity analysis revealed disproportionate or nonlinear relationships between parameter changes and model behaviors. Nonlinear sensitivity may indicate underlying problems in programming or model design; however, it may also reveal unanticipat-

ed results that shed light on the research questions explored in a simulation. Interpretations relating to cultural transmission and the sociospatial structure of smallscale societies are discussed."

"Neutrality, Relevance, Prescription, and the IPCC" 2017

Abstract: "The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) states that its assessment reports are "policyrelevant and yet policy-neutral, never policy-prescriptive." Here we investigate the meaning of that statement. Far from being a mere philosophical exercise, our investigation reveals that at least one of the components within the statement—the claim to policy-neutrality—is extremely misleading. Misunderstandings of this neutrality claim have resulted in real harm to the IPCC's efforts and image. In an effort to assist the IPCC in its endeavors, and to help restore

its credibility, we explore possible interpretations of the term "neutrality," expose past sources of misunderstanding, and suggest a plausible way of interpreting the term which is both defensible as a goal and fits with the actual activities of the IPCC. We suggest that the IPCC at minimum endorse this understanding of the "neutrality" term. Future science advising efforts should carefully choose how they present their aims, to avoid the potential confusions created by misleading connotations of "neutrality.""

She used the skills that she obtained during this time to help establish Oakland University's Student Organic Farm. Many of the students go on to work with community gardens in Detroit and Pontiac and even start their own urban or rural garden/farms. The farm also donates hundreds of pounds of produce to local food banks every year.

The farm is an amazing way for students to gain real world experience and a community of other farmers to help them along the way.
